This 1800s estate was the home of the Dousman family, who made their first fortune in the fur trade and later became one of the most prominent families in the state.

Unique example of Mediterranean-style architecture on the bluffs above the Mississippi. Built for Quincy native and world traveler W. George Metz.

Lakeport Plantation

Built in 1859, this is Arkansas's only remaining antebellum plantation home on the Mississippi River. It retains many of its original decorative finishes.
