


Figure 12. Panel tells the history of the Midwest Gold Rush, worker conditions, and 1911-12 labor strikes.




Figure 14. The panel discusses mussel ecology and how other aquatic species are dependent on mussel beds for food, nests, and protection from prey fish.




Figure 17. Panel discusses fashion, tariffs, and global business cycles that impacted pearl button industry.




Figure 19. Fairport Fish Hatchery 1950 – Present.
